## Car Parking you had your say

The online surveys were filled in, the business surveys returned and the meeting convened on the 18th of January. The hall at King Ecgberts school had been set out with tables arranged in small groups which didn't look like the usual arena for a loud and heated meeting. Indeed it wasn't; it was a very useful and informed melting pot of ideas where local residents had the chance to chat quietly with councillors, representatives from Sheffield Council highways department, the police, and the Dore Village Society committee. The expectation of a furore may explain the absence of some notable people, but those who did venture out were engaged in a very constructive evening which was excellently hosted by Kevin Harris. Kevin facilitated the initial discussion, deferred and quelled any potential provocateurs effectively and brought them around to the main business of taking the comments from the surveys and turning them into ideas to either consider or by-

He then directed everyone into small groups to discuss these points in further detail. Everyone had around ten minutes with each idea and then moved on until all groups had had a chance to comment on each idea. The evening ended in a similarly civilised manner with a secret vote to see the order of popularity. So what happens next? The Dore Village Society has already taken the views expressed and met with councillors to arrange the next stage, which is to look at the costs of all the options and to research what funding, if any, is available. In the next edition we will cover the options in detail once the practicalities have been assessed.

## So what has the DVS ever done for us?

The Dore Village Socety was founded in the sixties and is still holding to its original principles of preserving the character and community of Dore. The thirteen volunteers who make up the committee are assisted by an army of other willing helpers and cooperate with local clubs and organisations.

But in the last year, what did they actually do?

#### **Finance**

The Society was in a position to fund all projects agreed throughout the year, overseen by the DVS Treasurer.

#### Administration

Committee members attended meetings monthly (except in December) and 'staffed' the DVS office on the first Saturday of each month.

#### **Planning**

Scrutinised planning applications in order to defend the character of Dore from inappropriate development. Objections to the following applications were submitted to the Sheffield City Council Planning Department.

## **Planning matters**

It is worth reviewing the Dore Village Society's involvement in planning issues because it is one of our main activities. The Society takes a proactive role in attempting to influence both strategic changes in planning policy as well as decisions on significant planning applications.

We use the Dore Village Design Guide as the basis of our interventions. Having produced the Guide in 2005 following consultations with all households in Dore we are still the only neighbourhood in Sheffield to have produced such a document. Every household was given a copy! The guiding principle of the Design Guide, is not NIMBY nor to object to every new development, but to 'manage acceptable change through supplementary planning guidance.'

Over the past year we have had some success in strengthening the City Council's Core Strategy and design policies in South West Sheffield through making representations at the public examination and by making strong representations on behalf of the local community. We continue to press for safeguards to the environment of the village in seeking improvements to the City Policies and Sites proposals for residential design,

open space provision and maintenance and to extend conservation proposals.

After putting pressure on the local authorities for nearly 15 years and looking at several options we have at last succeeded in having the South Yorkshire Passenger Transport Executive's plans approved for a park and ride facility and pedestrian crossing at Dore Station. Not only will this encourage greater use of rail services but will remove car parking from the bottom of Dore Road and in front of the historic Abbeydale Road South almshouses. Our comments on the detailed proposals have achieved an improved design and better landscaping. The SYPTE appear to have obtained £400,000 to fund the scheme.

We have also achieved some success in improving new developments, for example at St Catherine's Close, but we have been disappointed when our objections have been ignored and when developments approved by the City Council. We particularly regret the development in the rear gardens of Totley Brook Road, adversely affecting the spacious character of an area of large stone Edwardian villas. We trust that the Society's objections to the over-sized flat development on 135 Dore Road will be successful. We supported

the developer on his approved scheme of detached houses on the site.

In line with our proactive stance on planning issues the Society is seeking to further our Design Guide policy for more comprehensive traffic management in the village by considering the introduction of 20mph speed limits and consulting on car parking arrangements in the village centre. Whilst there is a lull in the housing development market we are also working with the City planners to prepare a design brief for the former King Ecgbert School site off Furniss Avenue.

The passing of the Localism Act means we need to consider the possibility of setting up a Neighbourhood Forum in Dore and making a Local Plan under the Act. To accept such responsibilities would test our resolve to improve planning in the Village!

As the Society's Planning Coordinator I am available for, and welcome, consultation on any planning issues affecting the village.

There has been a lot of speculation recently about the future of this traditional local pub along with the future of Tina Gage who you all know is at the heart of the community in Dore. So with the assistance of the Dore to Door magazine I want to take this opportunity to set the record straight.

The simple problem is that as well as charging a significant level of rent, which in itself would not be an issue, Tina is forced to buy everything that she sells from behind the bar from Enterprise Inns and quite frankly the cost is extortionate. In reality all the loyal customers at the Devonshire see this on a regular basis from the amount she has to charge for the average pint.

No doubt many people reading this article will be aware of the recent debate that is took place in the House of Commons about the way pub companies treat their tenants. During the recent debate it was declared by one MP that some 65% of tenancies fail because of the inequity in the trading relationship between the likes of companies such as Enterprise Inns plc and their tenants. Unfortunately Tina could become an addition to these statistics if we do not support her now.

In the Commons many MPs are arguing that a voluntary code of practice to regulate the industry is the way forward whilst there are others who are vehemently against the "tied" relationship and want to bring in legislation to enforce a fairer relationship between landlord and tenant, as the current relationship is crucifying the pub industry and bringing about the closure of many good pubs.

You might not know this but Tina runs one of the most successful Enterprise Inns outlets in South Yorkshire in respect of the amount of beer and lager she sells. On the other hand, you may well know it because you see how busy she is and this is a fact that Enterprise Inns is well aware of.

Tina first approached Enterprise Inns in

February 2009 and told them about the problems they were creating in her pub by the amount she has to pay per barrel, they offered no assistance. She then approached them in August 2010 and once again they did nothing to assist. In January last year Tina was forced to take the matter to court under the Landlords and Tenants Act because they had not even offered her a new lease in the normal manner; a case which is dragging on. It was not long after this that she asked for my assistance. After all she is one very hard working lady in the community who, as well as running this successful pub and the cafe next door, has been forced to fight to save her business all on her own.

Tina now needs the assistance of all Dore communities if we are to keep this traditional pub open. As well as supporting her by visiting the "Dev" as all the loyal regulars do, please write to Nick Clegg and the CEO of Enterprise Inns to show the level of public support for Tina to receive a fair deal.

## Blacka Moor cleared of telegraph poles

Early this year, telegraph poles and wires that were very visible stretching across Cowsick Bog and other parts of Blacka Moor were removed. The Campaign for the Protection of Rural England had invited applications for money to be spent on areas of natural beauty that were blighted by power lines. Neil Fitzmaurice from Friends of Blacka Moor had pressed for Blacka Moor to be nominated and accepted as a worthy case. Before work could begin to remove the old power lines, new underground cables had to be laid along the main Hathersage Road. Work to transport the cleared poles across the land was done using a Clydesdale Horse and the result is fantastic.

This is one of the few projects undertaken on Blacka Moor, since Sheffield Wildlife Trust started managing the land that has received unanimous community support. Many other projects remain controversial, such as the installation of barbed wire fencing in order to graze

cattle on the moor and allow receipt of farm subsidies. This has sadly changed the feel of areas that could be wandered through and enjoyed, free from the stamp of human ownership and control. The moor is still grazed by the inconspicuous herds of wild deer and a glimpse of these is a privilege. Perhaps one day we will see these newer poles and wires removed, allowing the untamed character of this land that is so

rare and precious to remain.

People feel that they belong to this wild land, rather than the land belonging to us; a place to go to escape the modern world, free to learn for oneself. But the future of Blacka Moor is currently in the balance as the Council moves towards forming the Sheffield Moors Partnership. This will be a collaboration of the conservation industry players that will take over the management of the land such that it conforms to a

masterplan that will keep it in line with the management fashions of the day.

You can have your own say on the future of the moors at three public workshops, all from 18:45 until 21:00:

Wed 22nd February, at Totley Rise Methodist Church, Totley Thurs 1st March, at Quaker Meeting House, 10 St. James St, Sheffield

## Dore Recreation Ground wildflower mound – appeal for volunteers

There's a small mound on the Recreation Ground halfway along the tarmac path that was created when drainage was installed recently. It was always the intention of the Council's South West Area Ranger Service to seed this and create a wildflower mound. Unfortunately this didn't happen and the mound became an eyesore covered in thistles and weeds.

The work will involve light labour and take about two hours.



## An interview with our MP and Deputy PM Nick Clegg

After a trip to London, several phone calls, e-mails, and a cancellation due to some Euro monetary crisis, Nick Clegg and your editor finally met.

## Do you think it is actually beneficial that we are not in the Euro at the moment?

Oh, of course, of course! Saying that, 3 million jobs depend on our place in Europe, but clearly being part of the single currency, whatever my own personal views in the past, would not be right for the country and I can't see any likelihood of Britain joining the Euro any time soon, but it doesn't mean we should throw the baby out with the bathwater. We are part of the world's largest borderless single market and we are a very proud manufacturing exporting city, so it is very important that, even if we are outside the euro zone, we don't lose the advantages we have, because that's what creates jobs and puts money in the banks and food on the table which is the most important thing of all.

## What Lib Dem policy would you most like to see resurrected but the political compromise makes it unlikely?

If I was PM I would probably have moved faster on bankers bonuses. And obviously the incredibly controversial decision on university finance, I wouldn't have done if I was PM. I had this terrible dilemma that whoever I went into coalition with, both had

made it clear that they wanted fees to go up. You've got no leverage if both potential partners want to do the same thing. We tried to do the best, we've introduced a new system, which I think would be much fairer to most people where students wouldn't pay any upfront fees and they will actually pay less per month than graduates do at the moment.

## Where do you see the coalition after the next general election?

This coalition is an agreement for this parliamentary term, it is as simple as that, and we will fight the election as independent parties and see what the British people say. It was the only combination which could provide a stable government for a country facing a lot of real economic difficulties. I had talks with Gordon Brown and the Labour Party, but when you tot it all up there was no way that a Lib Dem and Labour coalition could have worked, as it would basically have been a minority government. That was not an outcome decided by any party or me, but was determined by how the British people voted, which said that we won't give any of you a majority and now you will have to sort it out. I am not going to start second guessing how people are going to vote in

the next election.

## But if it next general election comes out with the same result?

I am not going to make any predictions. When the election took place in May 2010, there was a threat from the money markets that they were going to pull the plug on Britain and if we didn't get our act together quickly and show that we had a plan to pull back from the brink. Those were exceptional circumstances which required an exceptional response which is what the coalition government was. There were very early decisions which were controversial to say they have not been universally popular is to understate it. There has been controversy, an ambitious and decisive programme of savings to fill the black hole in our finances and it hasn't made me exactly Mr Popular, I genuinely think the country and the economy would have keeled over altogether. There are difficulties now but at least we are not in the eye of the storm like other countries. That is the whole background to the decision to go into coalition. I have no idea if something like that will happen in the future. I sincerely hope that that kind of economic emergency won't be with us in 2015.

## The interview with the Deputy PM continues

The new planning strategy has a presumption that new builds will be allowed. We'd like assurances that planning in conservation areas will be respected?

In government we are not saying that any old planning goes. We are not doing this to override local objections to planning applications. In fact, in many ways, we have passed legislation that says that local people can take planning decisions into their own hands effectively or even have local referenda. That's what it's all about. The legislation such as it is, and I was adamant on this, is that planning should be sustainable. It's very important that word "sustainable" for the green spaces and national parks and heritage that we have and it must be shown that development is compatible with the environment we want to live in. Maybe the government hasn't explained itself well enough.

## So this should stop the over development of sites?

Planning at the moment is overly complicated. So why don't we try to clear up the guiding principle, give local communities new rights through the Localism Bill which sets out quite simply that if any development is sustainable there should be a presumption that it should go ahead. I want to make it clear to people in Dore and Totley and elsewhere, that this isn't going to stop people from objecting to the development on Dore Road. We also want to assure people that if there is a good development which communities want it is given the go ahead more quickly than it does at the moment.

#### Are you aware that your letter regarding the planning permission for 135 Dore Road was not originally included in the public record until complaints were made?

Yes I am. I think it was an innocent omission, but I can't jump in with both boots on in matters which are quite rightly local planning issues, but I have a role which I take very seriously as a constituency MP to make sure that people's views in the constituency are taken seriously. I have been to visit the site with Colin Ross. I can see why people are anxious about the apartments; two blocks of flats in an area like that, on the bend of a road and with a doctors' surgery. I don't want to overstep the mark, but of course Colin keeps me posted on what's going on.

## What do you see as the benefits for constituents having the Deputy PM as their MP?

I hope there are some benefits. I hold my weekly surgeries here in my office in Nether

Green and I hope to think that people come and raise issues with me and when I write as a constituency MP to ministers, I hope that they are helpful. I take my duties as a constituency MP very seriously and I find it still the most satisfactory part of my job because every week, whatever I'm doing nationally or internationally, my feet are firmly on the ground as people come and ask me to do things. I have a brilliant team here in the office and we try and deal with hundreds and hundreds of cases each week and I think we have a pretty good success rate.

#### Voter apathy is a concern; even though the turnout is statistically high in the Dore & Totley ward. What message do you have for the remaining people who still don't vote?

That it matters! I have always tried to be very upfront with people. I can't solve all problems and I should not be asked to solve all problems. Politicians are not miracle workers, yet democracy remains the best system I know of which has ever been invented in the history of mankind where people's general wishes are reflected in what people in positions of power then go on and do.

Newspapers, books etc. are free of VAT on the basis that knowledge should not be taxed. E-books, online subscription to news sites - the same knowledge

base, but consumed in a more ecofriendly way - these are subject to VAT. Any plans to change this?

I don't think there are any plans to equalize in that way. We made the controversial decision to increase the general rate of VAT a year ago and we said we would keep all the exemptions in place, as we did, and I think we are not going to continue to tamper with it.

#### But a lot of schools are starting to use these e-books and they are still being subjected to VAT?

There are still a huge number of idiosyncrasies in VAT and I accept that it is not a totally rational system but equally I think it important that in government, when you make big changes like that, that you give people a sense of stability, so there are no current plans for change.

## And finally, do you get a chance to read Dore to Door?

I do get your copies, but I don't read them completely cover to cover, I certainly think that at a time when people have lost faith in the national press, having publications coming through your door written by people who live locally about local issues is very valuable. It is hugely valuable to my local team to find out what people are thinking about.





Residents at Totley Brook were surprised to see the addition this summer of signs and seating on Totley Brook Open Space. There had been no local consultation. The Parks and Countryside

Department had done this as part of a policy to improve all the parks and open spaces in Sheffield. But is this a real improvement or a box ticking exercise? One of the seats is in a place where no-one would choose to sit and the massive metal sign on the field is inappropriate for such a rural location in a green belt and having the stunning Totley Moors and Blacka Moor as a backdrop. I was told that the signs are all the same across the entire city in an attempt to standardise all the council parks and open spaces. But do we want to be standardised? These seats and signs are very expensive. Had we been consulted, the cost of the metal sign could have gone most of the way to meeting the cost of a more appropriate one such as a stone plaque fixed in the nearby stone wall. If we want to replace this metal sign now with something more suitable for this location, the full cost will be down to us. To try to ensure better consultation in future, DVS has been registered as a Friends group of Totley Brook Open Space, Kings Croft Field and the Recreation Ground.

On a similar note, the stone steps at the top of the path leading to Totley Brook Open Space were recently repaired using a concrete flag. DVS pointed out that this was an inappropriate material for this location. The Public Rights of Way officers agreed and it has now been replaced with a natural stone.

Besides funding our own projects, DVS now meets regularly with our area Councillors as part of the Ward Forum and Community Assembly process. If anyone has any ideas as to how we or the council can improve our local environment, please let us know.

This new knowledge about English culture might help me one day when I have to teach English to my pupils. As a language teacher I'm not only going to teach English itself but also something about the culture as I saw how people in England live. I was amazed at the fact that Dore Primary School is working with so many other schools or organisations. With Y4 I've been to King Ecgberts Secondary School for P.E. and at Rowan School as well. During my week with Y1 three men from Sheffield Wednesday came and taught them a special P.E. lesson.

I had a great time at Dore Primary School and think that the children have marvellous opportunities in the different ways they can learn.

#### Report 2011 - 12

This year we contributed to support work on the Thai/Burmese border by providing toys for three different groups of refugee children using some of our sponsored walk money. We are beginning to develop links with The Little Angels School in Kumasi, Ghana. We chose to link with this school as it has a mission statement to try to educate children through creative methods, and is run by a lady who has lived in the UK and is now trying to replicate aspects of our education system in Ghana. After liaising with the head of Little Angels, we agreed that our first communication between the

children should be a picture exchange. Children have been encouraged to draw / paint / take photos that they feel represent themselves, their families, our school and our community. These have been collated into a lovely book by some of our Y6 children. We are hoping to receive a similar book from Little Angels soon. We can't wait to receive our picture book from Ghana!

We have enjoyed hosting a German Language Assistant for a term and also welcomed two American and a Swiss student who are all teacher trainees. We also hosted children from Ghana who were living with one of our families whilst

their mother studied at the University. We are very fortunate to be able to broaden our horizons in this way as we move towards the highest level of International School Award potentially gaining national recognition as an ambassador for international work.

## Apartment scheme rejected unanimously

#### 135 Dore Road

The application for both the multistorey apartments and 8 house scheme went before Committee on the 6th February. The Committee unanimously rejected the apartment scheme (10 votes to nil) and approved the housing scheme in what was a very marginal decision (6 votes to 4). The developer has the option of going to appeal on the apartments and may even come back with a resubmission. We have seen examples where this particular developer has either gone to appeal or has resubmitted applications over and over again as the residents of Baslow Road and Ecclesall Road South know only too

The 2,000 objections from residents played a big part in the decision and were a very clear demonstration that the apartment scheme did not meet the needs or aspirations of local people. Councillor Colin Ross has wholeheartedly supported residents throughout the process and has provided direct access to the Head of Planning to enable our

representations and concerns to be heard. He has also consulted widely with residents and put forward representations along with Aubrey and myself at the Committee meeting. He has made a very positive contribution and we would like to thank him on behalf of the residents for his sterling support. We would also like to thank our fellow colleagues at the Dore Conservation Group as well as David Crosby at the DVS who helped us put the finishing touches to our representations.

We have made some interesting discoveries under the Freedom of Information Act and have extensive examples of material information that was withheld from both the public and the planning committee members and are now considering taking these matters up with the Local Government Ombudsman as part of a wider complaint against the Council for maladministration. This evidence takes the form of written statements made by officers which are contrary to the recommendations made by the Planning Officer in a report to Committee on which planning decisions are made.

We would advise any resident who is objecting to a planning application to use

the Freedom of Information Act to disclose what discussions are taking place between the planners and developers and also to ascertain what is being said between officers. Anyone wanting to know how these requests work should get in touch with us via the Editor and we would be more than happy to share our experiences with you.

Finally the residents of Dore should be very proud of themselves for coming out in their numbers to preserve the character and nature of their village and preventing inappropriate development. We would like to think this is the end of the apartments but we may need to join forces once again should there be a resubmission.

#### **Dore Parish Church news**

Not only the early snowdrops but also the first crocuses are appearing in the Churchyard. You should see even more spring bulbs in flower this year as last autumn we planted another 2 bags of daffodils provided through Street Force. Because the Churchyard has no space for any new graves it is technically 'closed' and responsibility for ensuring that it is safe lies with Sheffield City Council. The Council have recently told us that they need to fell two of the big old beech trees because they have been attacked by fungus. They and we rightly want to avoid a repeat of the incident 10 years ago when one such beech tree fell unheralded. It is really encouraging to compare how the churchvard looks now with its state a few years ago - grateful thanks to those who have helped/are helping in this.

As the discussions with our architect about possible future development of the church building are still continuing and will not be resolved in the immediate future, our Church Council has decided to hire a digital organ for the interim period as it

can provide a greater range of music than was possible with the small chamber organ that we were using. This was installed just in time for our Christmas services so we are already enjoying the benefit of the instrument.

### Homeopathy

#### Medicine for the 21st century?

The inflammatory process is one of the important ways that our body learns what has infected it and how to deal with it, but medicine commonly assumes that symptoms must be inhibited, suppressed and controlled. Inflammation must be suppressed and discharges must be stopped. Homeopathy believes that the symptom is a signal of something, i.e heart disease or a migraine may be a response to stress and stress is a response to a difficult situation the body finds itself in. Homeopathy looks at the route cause of the problem taking the whole body into account and uses a remedy which has similar mental, emotional and physical picture as the person presents with. This principle is known as "the law of similars". It utilises minute doses of a substance individually chosen for its capacity to cause symptoms similar to those that the sick person is experiencing. It is not simply a coincidence that two of the

very few conventional medical treatments that augment immune responses are immunisations and allergy treatments, both of which are ultimately based on the homeopathic principle of similars and using "like to treat like".

The NHS pharmaceutical bill currently costs us the tax payers £11 billion per year. The more drugs we take the more we seem to need - it is not "free"! Homeopathy is a highly cost effective, safe and very interesting alternative for solving some of the health and financial problems of the 21st century.

## Do mobile phone signals effect health?

The controversy over mobile phones and any potential health issues has raged on for a few years but what are the facts behind the headlines?

The first notable point discovered was the huge public contradiction between the health issues over mobile phone use compared to the siteing of the communication masts. A vast proportion want their new phones to connect to a 3G network and they're prepare to risk their immediate health by having this technology so close to their heads. They are not however prepared to have a mast near their children or homes. Indeed parents appear to be prepared to give their children mobile phones but object to the sighting of masts around schools.

So do mobile phone masts or base units pose more of a health threat than using a mobile phone?

The general consensus is that the field strengths from masts is low and it is unlikely to be more of a problem than any other form of RF (Radio Frequency) data communications.

The mobile companies are quite prepared to admit mobile phones should not be over or misused. The Motorola user handbook clearly stating "[1] DO NOT hold the cellular telephone such that the antenna is in contact with exposed parts of the body, especially the face or eyes, while the unit is turned on.

[2] When used with an externally mounted vehicular antenna DO NOT operate the cellular telephone when a bystander is within one foot (0.3m) of the externally mounted antenna."

Which could imply that they are aware of potential health issues with using mobile phones.

The 1996 paper by Lai & Singh shows single

and double DNA strand breaks in brain cells of rats exposed to 2.45GHz SARs of 1.2 W/Kg, which is comparable with levels in the heads of mobile phone users.

Dr Allan Pacey, senior lecturer in andrology at Sheffield University, casts doubt on testicular cancer research saying, "If you're using your phone for four hours a day, presumably it is out of your pocket for longer. That raises a big question: how is it that testicular damage is supposed to occur?"

Research by the Imperial College London identified a total of 1,397 children aged four or younger who had developed leukemia or a tumour in the brain or the nervous system between 1999 and 2001. In each of the 1,397 cases, the ICL researchers looked at the distance to the nearest mast, the total power generated by any base stations situated within 700 metres and power density for any base stations within 1,400 metres of the birth address.

"We found no pattern to suggest that the children of mums living near a base station during pregnancy had a greater risk of developing cancer than those who lived elsewhere," said Professor Paul Elliott. Commenting on the report, John Bithell of Oxford University's cancer research group, said the findings proved there were far greater risks from mobile phone use than the risk of cancer, such as using the phone while driving.

So with all this scientific research over mobile phones, why has a definitive answer not been issued?

It appears to be how the research is undertaken. As they do not "substantiate" anything in relation

to exposure to RF/MW(Radio Frequencies/ MicroWaves); they are looking into the increase in incidence of adverse health effects such as cancer.

The catch word is "substantiated" evidence. This essentially means evidence of a link must be proven.

Epidemiological studies on human populations do not look for "proof" or "substantiation" but at increases in incidence of a disease, or relative risk ratios.

Historically epidemiological studies on other questionable health risks like tobacco and asbestos did not "substantiate" that these carcinogens cause cancer, they did however show, a significant increased risk of developing cancer from exposure. Even though the results were not "substantive or proven", this did not prevent the health authorities from taking corrective action. It is interesting that the electromagnetic radiation industry and its supporters insist an absolute connection must be found before correction action be taken.

Which is quite possibly why any answers remain ambiguous.

What is clear, whilst ever the jury is still out over mobile phones, is that out the public are quite happy to embrace this new technology. However they remain suspicious of it. Should a definitive health issue ever emerge, the general public would like to still have the control; they know that their mobile phone can be turned off, but what about a phone mast? Once positioned, can it or would it ever be removed?



## Ebenezer Hall and his portrait by Joseph Bentley, R.B.A.

Dore Village Society's heritage collection has recently had a most unexpected donation. Mrs Jackie Hall of Goathland near Whitby has donated to the collection a three-quarter size portrait of Ebenezer Hall which used to hang in the hall of Abbeydale Hall, the home of Ebenezer Hall until his death in 1911. Mrs Hall's husband was the great-nephew of Ebenezer and Jackie wished that the portrait returned to Dore.

On the reverse the label reads:

As a token of their Appreciation the village of Dore and Totley and surrounding districts decided to make a suitable recognition of their Benefactor's Kindness. A Committee was formed and in a short time funds were provided by the inhabitants sufficient to commission

Joseph Bentley R.B.A. Change Alley, Sheffield and Resident of Dore

to paint a three-quarter life size portrait of Ebenezer Hall – 11 November 1896. (Cost 100 quineas )

Born 18th November 1820 at Middleton by Wirksworth. Taken from the Thesis 'Studies in Local History' by Joan Lacey- Hatton. 1974.

No less fascinating is the story of Joseph Herbert Bentley. As a member of the Royal Society of British Artists which has included many eminent artists, Joseph Bentley was a skilled artist, yet just after he painted Ebenezer's portrait he is described in the 1898-9 White's Sheffield Directory as a photographer of Prideaux Chambers, Change Alley.



In the 1901 Census Joseph is described as a boarder living at Swing Farm with the Frith Family. Swing Farm is now demolished but was on the first bend on Savage Lane, next to Nab Farm. Born in Lincoln he was aged 34 and single. Joseph was described as an artist, portrait painter and sculptor, working on his own account and occupying two rooms on the farm.

Unless a Dore resident can say differently, that Joseph was lodging with William Frith may well have been because William Frith was not only a

farmer but was described as a quarry owner and stone dresser – a useful landlord for a sculptor.

By 1909, according to White's Directory, Joseph Bentley's fortunes seem to have improved still further and he is described as an artist with a shop at 37-39 Foster's Buildings, High Street, Sheffield, and living at 360 Sharrow Lane.

## The Wildlife garden

A blackbird with an injured leg and only a few white feather shafts for a tail - the result of an all too close encounter with a cat - stood lopsidedly by my feet. He was 'vacuuming' up the mealworms I had thrown down for him so guickly, anyone would have thought he was a competitor in a 'how-many-mealworms-can-you-eatin-a-minute' world record attempt. Mind you, the reason for his haste soon became apparent: my garden's dominant blackbird landed just a few feet away, feathers bristling in fury as the usurper devoured 'his' mealworms. Yet unlike the injured bird who was emboldened by hunger, he did not dare venture any closer. Sensing this, the lame blackbird carried on eating and if anything, it was at an even faster pace than before, when all of a sudden, a wren shot out from beneath a nearby shrub and landed next to the larger bird. With a highpitched squeak, it grabbed a mealworm right from under the startled blackbird's beak and flew back to the bush in a whirr of tiny wings.

Being so small and elusive, I find it hard to accept that, according to the RSPB, wrens are in fact Britain's most common species of breeding bird, with just over eight million pairs. Nevertheless, they are most abundant in deciduous woodlands and consequently this is the best place to hear their lovely clear song: a trilling call that rises and falls like a roller-coaster, finishing with a flourish and delivered at the same frantic pace as everything else the bird does. It is also very loud, surprisingly so for such a small bird, but in reality this makes perfect sense, because the male's song has to reach a female that spends most of her time skulking around in the undergrowth.

The males also do something else unexpected, they build a number of nests in their territory and try to entice a female to accept one of them. When food is plentiful, they may even get two or more females laying their eggs in these nests. As well as open-fronted nest boxes, wrens also use crevices in trees and walls to make their spherical nests, yet while the nest shape makes the chicks notoriously difficult to study, it does little to protect them from predators. If all goes well, the female lays five or six whitish coloured eggs which she incubates for approximately 16 days, a similar length of time as the chicks take to fledge. Remarkably, she rears them all by herself and then goes through it again in July, with a second clutch of eggs. To succeed, she needs an abundant supply of small insects and spiders, not only during the breeding season, but all year round. Harsh winters are especially difficult for wrens and many can die from starvation or succumb to the cold. To help overcome this, during severe weather wrens will sometimes gather together, cramming themselves into an empty nest box to keep warm. The highest number ever recorded was 63 wrens in one nest box, but this is likely to have been surpassed during the last record-breaking winter.

Usually, the only time I catch sight of wren in my garden is when one flits between shrubs; a brown blur as it moves amongst the climbers or plant containers. feverishly searching in every nook and cranny for insects, more akin to a cartoon creation than anything alive. However, one cheeky character has recently started sitting on my kitchen door-handle and peers in through the window whenever she wants feeding. When live food is in short supply, wrens may take crumbs of cheese from the ground, nonetheless prefer suet and of course, mealworms especially if they can be snatched right from under a blackbird's bill.

### The Chicken Lady

Thank you to everyone for your emails; once again I'm looking forward to hearing many more of your stories in 2012.

With winter finally drawing to an end we can now look forward to spring although for many of us the winter has been quite mild, so much so that many of the spring bulbs have begun blooming a little earlier than usual. If only the same was true for my hens. You'd think an early spring would hasten the first batch of eggs, especially with the delicious noodles and peas cooked for them on the cold winter afternoons; but all this effort is to no avail. Being nice works with my husband; cook him his favourite supper and yes I will get those new shiny red shoes! The girls on the other hand will only lay when they are good and ready and there isn't anything I can do to bring the eggs on any quicker.

The start of spring also signals the start of the big spring garden clean, for me this involves removing the bark chippings within the chicken run and topping up with new. The old chippings don't go waste though as they are scattered within the borders and make a great fertiliser/mulch. Although natural wood mulches and bark chippings are available from local garden centres or DIY shops I would advise a trip to the local Ecclesall Wood Saw Mill. The chippings are half the price and if you fancy a work-out then you can save a bit more and fill your own bags —

the mill is open 10am to 3pm most days.

I know a few of the 'villagers' are setting up their first home brood this spring and I have been asked where's a good place to start with the birds – and before you question which direction this column is going... I am definitely only talking about chickens here! For the past couple of years I have hatched fertilized eggs; I convinced my husband that this was far more cost effective than buying fully grown chickens. A fertilized egg costs a mere £2 compared with a fully grown Cochin pullet costing around £30. Of course I didn't explain the true reality that 12 fertilized eggs could lead to 12 handsome but very noisy cockerels! Of course the sense of the unknown is so much more fun for me, however I do have somewhere I can off-load the noisy boys if required. A little advice: I recommend finding a home for the potential cockerels before experiencing hatching your own eggs, unless you are lucky enough to be able to keep the living 4am alarm clocks. Alternatively you could take my husband's advice as six fat cockerels make six very tasty Sunday dinners! I never take my husband's advice, and as for my cockerel chicks, they are happily living at my friend's farm park!

If all of this 'chicken nonsense' is too much trouble and you simply prefer to pick your eggs from the shelf of the local supermarket, make sure you know your eggs and the collection of marketing terms used to help you buy into the profitable world of animal welfare. 'Farm-

Fresh' is the latest word splashed onto the boxes of the supermarket shelf and it leads us into thinking of quintessential country living and animals happily roaming free on the farm. Unfortunately this is far from the truth. 'Farm-Fresh' eggs are actually produced by caged hens with only a tiny amount of space to move around. Then there's "Barn eggs", unfortunately for the chickens this is not a quirky old barn with a charming owner merrily collecting the eggs and placing them in the basket every morning, it's actually an industrial unit housing thousands of hens. These hens do however have access to perching space and nesting boxes although this only amounts to roughly nine chickens per square metre. The only happy hens are free range hens; it's far better to have an egg knowing the chicken can lay freely with a happy chirp. My preference as you'd expect is to keep your own chickens of course! It comes as no surprise that your home laid organic eggs taste so much better than the supermarket variants; happy hens' lay tasty eggs. If you do have to buy then please try and buy organic eggs or at least free-range ones.

Finally if any of you hen keepers require a chicken-sitter to look after your brood when you go on holiday this year then please get in touch. Now you don't have any excuses for not starting your home chickens this year...





## Tigers 1st XV

As it is we sit a mid table tenth in the league with 37 points, ten points above the relegation zone, with six sides below us. Four of these sides have to come to Dore Moor in the second half of the season. Seven matches have been won and ten lost. Nine bonus points have been added to 28 winning points. ### Olympic torch in Sheffield






